### **Reaching Out To Future Scientists**

Using only ordinary cabbage juice and several common household items, AWIS Outreach Committee members performed chemistry magic at Hope Elementary School's Science Day in Carlsbad on Feb. 22 and the Girl Scout Science After-School Program in Santee on Feb. 27. These annual events allow students to experience the fun of science through hands-on activities with volunteers ranging from rocket scientists to animal biologists.

The AWIS team (Anna-Maria Hays, Alycen Nigro, and Cathy Manner) dazzled 3<sup>rd</sup> through 6<sup>th</sup> grade students with an exploration of pH chemistry. In a brief introductory lecture the kids learned that liquids can be classified into three groups – acid, base, or neutral. One easy means to assess pH is using red cabbage juice, which turns pink in the presence of acid and green in the presence of base. After being instructed in the fundamentals of the scientific method, including hypothesis formation and the importance of controls, the students had the opportunity to test the pH of many ordinary household substances. They discovered that cleaning products, such as laundry detergent, dish detergent, and Windex, were bases. In contrast, liquids which can be ingested were either neutral (milk) or slightly acidic (soda). The students greatly enjoyed performing the experiments, asked many questions, and wanted to test even more substances! To encourage this interest and enthusiasm, the AWIS members handed out detailed information so that the students could set up their own experiments at home.

### April AWIS Event: Cyber Crime-A National and Local Focus

The 'I love you' virus, cyber attacks on the Pentagon, and the internet twins custody battle are only the most recent, highly-publicized examples of criminal acts being committed in cyberspace. On April 11 at La Jolla Pharmaceuticals, FBI Special Agent Lori Jensen shared insights into how her agency investigates and prevents high-tech crime with an intrigued audience.

Cyber crime can happen to anyone. Jensen highlighted several examples, including ongoing computer hacking by organized criminal groups in Russia and the Ukraine, which has now resulted in more than 1 million credit card numbers being stolen. She also described how hackers can infiltrate an unsuspecting ISP (Internet Service Provider) and use the Internet to penetrate highly secured systems such as the Pentagon's DOD (Department of Defense) and universities such as MIT, as was the case in March 1998. Hackers do not fit a stereotypical profile; they range from young teenagers to serious professionals and can be found everywhere. There is even an annual Def Con hackers' convention held in Las Vegas.

Although the FBI does not have jurisdiction in prosecuting cyber criminals in other countries, they are working to alert everyone to the serious impact that cyberterrorism can cause.

Special Agent Jensen also shared her personal experiences within the FBI. She discussed how agents are trained for their positions, and how she and her co-workers stay up to date with advancing technologies.


